Many of the women are now interested in pursuing further degree study at Community College of Philadelphia; WEI will assist in this effort. On November 22nd WEI sponsored a tremendously successful Domestic Violence Seminar facilitated by Brigette Sancho. Anna Banks from our Newark area WEI was one of the presenters. ARE YOU READY FOR FINANCIAL PEACE? REVOLUTIONARY SERIES WILL DEBUT IN JANUARY

Debt is all around us. And it is in our church, too. More than 70 percent of Americans live paycheck to paycheck. Over 35 percent of Christian marriages end in divorce, and money problems are the number one cause. Financial Peace University has a long history of helping families successfully confront these problems head-on.

The program is a 13-week, biblically based accountability curriculum that teaches you to manage God's money and resources in a godly way. It empowers you to make the right financial decisions to achieve your financial goals, teaching you to eliminate debt, build wealth, and give like never before. On average, families reduce their debt by \$5,300 and save \$2,700 in just 91 days.

This course, sponsored by Women's Empowerment Initiative (WEI), will be offered to anyone interested. Classes begin January 9, 2009 at Oxford Presbyterian Church.

It's A Fact . . .

- Among 10 to 24 year olds, homicide is the leading cause of death for African Americans, the second leading cause
 of death for Hispanics, and the third leading cause of death for American Indians, Alaska Natives, and Asian/Pacific
 Islanders (CDC 2006).
- Of the 5,570 homicides reported in 2003 among 10 to 24 year olds, 86% were males and 14% were females (CDC 2005).
- Male students are more likely to be involved in a physical fight than female students (41% vs. 25%; CDC 2004).
- In a nationwide survey of high school students, about 6% reported not going to school on one or more days in the 30 days preceding the survey because they felt unsafe at school or on their way to and from school (CDC 2004).
- In 2004, more than 750,000 young people ages 10 to 24 were treated in emergency departments for injuries sustained due to violence (CDC 2006).
- In addition to causing injury and death, youth violence affects communities by increasing the cost of health care, reducing productivity, decreasing property values, and disrupting social services (Mercy et al. 2002).

Did You Know . . .

According to the October 2008 figures released by the U.S. Department of Labor -Bureau of Labor Statistics, 4.9 percent of women age 20 and over in the civilian workforce are unemployed; this compares with 3.5 percent unemployment among the same population in October 2007. More startling is the fact that unemployment among African American women in this same group was 8.8 percent in October 2008, compared to 7.0 percent in the same period last year. Based on the current economic crisis facing our country, this situation will only worsen. Given the increasing economic downturn in our country and, particularly the threatened negative impact on women heads of household, we are convinced and convicted of the great need for the Women's Empowerment Initiative Alternative Staffing Agencies. The Women's Empowerment Initiatives' Staffing Services ("WEI Staffing Services") are worker-focused agencies designed to connect low-skilled women, especially single heads-ofhouseholds, with appropriate entry-level jobs through competitive temporary and temporary-to-permanent job placements. A major component of the services will be to equip women with the skills needed in the current workforce. We will partner with other agencies in this workforce training effort. WEI Staffing Services will also provide job placement and retention support services through contracts with local training organizations.

The following is excerpted from an article by economist Dr. Cecelia Conrad, Professor and Dean of Faculty at Scripps College. "Black Women: The Unfinished Agenda" was published in the September 2008 edition of The American Prospect; it sheds even greater insight on the plight experienced by women, particular female heads-of-household.



"Like black men, black women live in neighborhoods far from employment opportunities and with low-performing schools. Like white women, black women experience occupational segregation, a gender wage gap and the challenge of balancing family and work. We are discriminated against because we are black. We are discriminated against because we are women. We are discriminated against because we are both.

Because of the limited economic prospects for black men, black women are likely to be both primary caregivers and primary breadwinners in our families. In nearly 44 percent of black families with children, a woman is the primary breadwinner. with children and account for 14 percent of aggregate family income. Hence, the gender wage gap and the lack of labor-market opportunities has a bigger impact on the economic well-being of black families than it does for other groups."
